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# Appointment of **Archbishop Mark O'Toole**

n 27th April 2022, Pope Francis named Bishop Mark O'Toole as the 8th Archbishop of Cardiff in succession to Archbishop George Stack. On hearing of his appointment, the Archbishop-Elect said: "I am grateful and humbled by the trust that the Holy Father has

placed in me. I face the task ahead both with excitement and a certain trepidation, conscious of my own weaknesses. Throughout my life I have learnt to trust the Lord's will more deeply, and in these days of Eastertide especially, I have taken much comfort from Jesus' word to his Apostles, "Do not be afraid. I go before you..." It is with this deep sense that the Lord goes before all of us in this new mission, that I fully embrace this new calling in my life."

A small group of pupils from St Illtyd's, along with Head Teacher David Thomas and Deputy Head Teacher Paul Moriarty had the privilege to be invited to St David's Metropolitan Cathedral by Archbishop George Stack on the day of the announcement to meet the new Archbishop-Elect - Mark O'Toole.

Archbishop-Elect Mark O'Toole was installed as 8th Archbishop of Cardiff on Monday 20th June 2022 at Cardiff Cathedral. We look forward to welcoming Archbishop Mark to our school later this term. His visit will be covered in the Autumn issue of the Illtydian.

celebrate the Queen's Platinum Jubilee.

Pupils from Eco Club spent a session out in the garden weeding. Pupils who are following the Duke of Edinburgh Award have been spending time in the garden as part of their volunteer hours of the programme. They have started work on the Reflection Garden (see Spirituality Page for more on this), designed by our Chaplain Victoria Wonnacott.

A small group of pupils have been working with teacher Maggie Powell to create beautifully decorated stepping stones that will be used in the garden.

We have also been working with the Council's Coed Caerdydd project. This project aims to

increase tree coverage throughout the city and to care for our existing woodlands. We invited Chloe Jenkins from the project to our school. She conducted a tree survey, recording which trees we already have at the school and seeing what we can add and where, in order to maximise our green space. Chloe and her team will be providing support in the garden and will be providing us with trees and shrubs in the autumn term.

e were delighted to welcome back the STEM Roadshow to St Illtyd's this term. The theme of this year's roadshow is Magnetism, and the presentation


