#### Welsh National Holocaust Memorial Day (2)

On the 28th January 2018, a group of Year 9 pupils and four Year 6 pupils from St John Lloyd RC Primary School joined together to attend the Welsh National Holocaust Memorial Day at City Hall. It was a moving experience and one that left a lasting impression on all concerned.

We arrived at City Hall and were invited to write positive thoughts on large posters as the theme for this service was "The Power of Words"; many of our pupils wrote about always saying kind things to others. We saw a piece of art that had been painted showing Jewish People behind barbed wire in striped pyjamas and our pupils discussed with the artist how they must have felt during the Holocaust and how it can't happen again.

We then went into the service and listened to a survivor of the Holocaust speak about her experience. Lady Milena Grenfall-Baines MBE was one of the last children to be saved on the train led by Sir Nicholas Winston in 1939. She showed us an item that was important to her, an autograph book with her family's signatures and some words from them.

Her father had organised this in case they never saw her again which turned out to be what happened. The pupils were lucky enough to meet Lady Milena and she had a photograph with them; she also offered to attend our school to share her experiences with others so watch this space!




## Creative writing stars!

Firstly award winning Welsh author and storyteller Daniel Morden thrilled pupils with a chilling story from his most recent book "Secret Tales from Wales". Secondly pupils heard the amazing story of Eric Ngalle Charles. Eric is a poet, author and playwright who has claimed asylum in Wales. Eric's uplifting story described how literature and creative writing helped him to overcome his hasty departure from Cameroon when he was 17, how he survived being a victim of human trafficking and living on the streets in Russia before eventually coming to live in Wales. Our pupils were captivated by his story.

Pupils were able to meet both writers after the sessions. The day ended with a tour of the University campus. Pupils' feedback on the day was overwhelmingly positive and we are now planning to take a group to the Hay Festival itself in May.


