wo 'Old Boys' from the old St Illtyd's Grammar School for boys in Splott who started in 1959, and were in contact with each other, decided in 2008 that it would be a good idea to hold a school reunion each year. Both of those boys contacted more 59's and, by the following year, there were eighteen who met in the 'Gatekeeper Pub' in Westgate Street. There was a lot of catching up on old times, stories about the rugby and cricket teams, the interaction with the teachers, school trips, general banter and leg-pulling, and after a few pints (or several), they all gave a rendition of the school song. The pub is usually busy on Saturdays, especially when there is an event at the Principality Stadium. After the school song there was sometimes a lot of clapping, but the 59ers thought it must be sympathy.

When possible, the group now hold annual reunions every first Saturday in July at the Gatekeepers. There are now 35 names on the email hub, which is almost a third of the 1959 starters. Not all can attend the reunions as some live in America, Australia, France, Gozo (near Malta) and England. Since the meetings started in 2008 the 59ers sadly lost four of the original reunion members. The mood at the meetings is like being part of a 'Band of Brothers'. There is no feeling of superiority amongst the group even though some have had more successful careers.

In June 2019, the annual reunion was held at The Cardiff and County Club in Westgate Street to celebrate 60 years of friendship with a 'shirt and tie' sit-down meal.

CHOOSING CAREFULLY

A lot has changed since the Grammar School days. Back then there were no GCSEs. Grammar schools had GCEs and Secondary schools CSEs. In St Illtyd's there was no coursework towards results, only exams. The standard was high, and if a pupil achieved seven passes, that would have been considered excellent, with five being the target for A level entry. The choice of subjects to be taken in exams was not as varied as today, and from their second year in 1960 onwards, each boy had to choose his subjects carefully to suit his career prospects. Subjects available included Religion, Mathematics (Algebra, Geometry, Trigonometry), English language, English literature, Welsh, Latin, French, Spanish, Science (Chemistry, Biology, Physics), History, Geography, Music, and Art.

Recently, one of our group thought it would be a good idea to ask if there were any old photographs in the archives at St Illtyd's Catholic High School dating from our time at the school. He telephoned Luisa May, Community Focused Schools Coordinator, and Luisa very kindly invited two of us to visit the school to look at some of the pictures stored in the archives. It was a really interesting visit. Luisa gave us copies of many historical photographs






St Illtyd's & Wates - A new partnership
