Chapel

We are delighted to be able to announce that our chapel has had a renovation and is back in use as the main focus of regular worship in the school.

The chapel has been decorated and certain religious aspects have been added to the decor. We have acquired a beautiful set of Stations of the Cross that have been painted in the style of the Liberation Theology movement and were inspired by St Oscar Romero. Liberation Theology

is a religious movement especially among Roman Catholic clergy in Latin America that combines political philosophy usually with a theology of salvation as liberation from injustice. We



have chosen this style of Stations as a constant reminder of our mission as Catholics to combat injustice in all its forms and to spread Christ's message of love in our words and actions.

Our altar has been adorned with a tapestry of the Last Supper to remind us of the sacrificial nature of the faith. Christ's sacrifice on the cross is an example to us all that we will be called to put others first at times in our lives and that this can be a difficult decision for us to make.

We have recently been entrusted with a statue of Our Lady of Fatima. The statue stands proudly on our altar as a reminder of the important role Mary plays in the story of our salvation as the Mother of God. In time we hope to take the statue to our feeder primary schools and involve the younger pupils of our community in collaborative acts of worship.

The Chapel has already seen plenty of activity in the last few weeks. All pupils in Year 7, 8 and 9 have taken part in a service. The service focused on the meaning of the Epiphany, the visit of the Magi (or wise men) to the infant Jesus, and the gifts they brought to him. Our focus was on the gifts that we have and how we can use them to serve God. This term we will focus on the Stations of the Cross and what Jesus' journey to Calvary means for us in the modern day.

Staff have taken advantage of the Chapel by having a weekly prayer reflection on a Friday morning. The focus of these reflections varies from



week to week and can be personal to the member of staff leading it or on a wider religious aspect.

We have recently appointed a new Chaplain, Mrs Victoria Wonnacott (pictured), to help us drive forward the spiritual nature of the school. I would like to take this opportunity to welcome her on behalf of all of you to the St Illtud's community.

t St Illtyd's Catholic High School, we make it part of our mission to ensure that by the time our pupils leave us, they will be equipped with basic life skills. One important and vital life skill is being able to save a life. With this in mind, every year we arrange a one hour Basic First Aid Awareness course with St John Ambulance Cymru.

Over two days in January, all our Year 7 pupils took part in this. During the interactive and engaging one hour course, pupils learnt all about how to conduct a primary survey, how to call for an ambulance, how to put someone in the recovery position, how to do CPR on a casualty, how to

save someone from choking, dealing with bleeding and how to use a defibrillator. Pupils thoroughly enjoyed the course and gained confidence in saving a life. We are extremely grateful to Dionne Ford, Community Trainer, for her engaging delivery of the sessions and to Amy Davies, Community Engagement Manager at St John Ambulance Cymru for organising the sessions for us.

For young people aged 11-18 who would like to develop their first aid skills further, or who are interested in a career within the paramedic or medical profession, St John Ambulance Cymru offer the Cadets programme. The Cadets programme teaches young people first aid

along with other vital life skills such as social action and personal development. There are opportunities to put skills learnt to effective use by taking part in competitions and helping with medical cover at events alongside adult volunteers when they are old enough.



Hay Festival Scribblers Tour 2022



ward winning YA author Jenny Valentine hosted this year's Scribblers Tour as she and two other amaging authors helped the children express themselves creatively through poems. The pristine performing poet and playwright Joseph Coelho started the event with his incredible book told through poems: The Girl Who Became A Tree. After a short introduction to the book, he then encouraged the audience to create their own mesostic poem (a poem that has specific letters in the middle of each line to form a word). Joseph then went on to explain his story on how he became a poet and how most of his books were inspired from his experiences and hobbies. The audience then learned how to use different 'word worlds' to describe certain objects (their dream library). Some members used musical terms to describe their library while others used the world of food. One member even used the world of Lord of The Rings! To end the session, Mr Coelho shared his insights as to how poetry is imaginatively used to create stories.

Next was the magnificent Manjeet Mann, an author who fought against everyone's doubts to be where she is today. In the panel, she read an extract of her book: Run Rebel, a book about a girl who also has to face challenges in her life to define her place in the world. In her book, she uses repetitive writing, alliteration, and unique word placement to make the story feel more real. The audience practiced these techniques when they wrote non-stop about different emotions, writing their own poems using only alliteration, and writing about what they would take to different extreme locations. Rounding off the panel, Manjeet taught the audience to express themselves through their words by encouraging them to read their alliteration poems.



Student Experience: I really enjoyed talking with Joseph Coelho while he signed my book. We only talked for a couple of minutes but it was really insightful talking with him. We talked about the future and about how writing will influence the future so much. It was really fun talking with him even though it was so short. I'd love to go back there again next year.

To finish the event, some of the Cardiff Metropolitan University's own aspiring authors held a Q&A session so that the children left the event feeling satisfied. They then held their own activity in which the audience had to write a backstory about how a certain image came to be, erase the story, and write a different story. This taught the audience to let go of pieces they've written so that they could improve them.

Overall, this year's Scribblers Tour was a calligraphic celebration for aspiring authors and literacy fanatics alike. The activities engaged everyone in the audience and the story telling from both authors captivated everyone.
