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Leading the way in the "New Normal"

s a school, we have had to do things a little differently this year. Unfortunately, we had to cancel our Year 6 Open Evening, meaning that we had to find a different way of showcasing our school to prospective pupils and parents. We decided to employ the services of Escape to Design, who we have worked with closely for many years and who produce "The New Illtydian" for us, to capture a virtual tour of our school. The virtual tour allows users to explore the whole school and view snapshots in the daily life of the school.

Pete Surma, director of Escape to Design said: "We felt that offering St Illtyd's the tool that embraces technology to assist prospective pupils - and their parents - to view the school interactively, walk around its spaces and 'connect' with imagery and video at the same time, was an absolute must in order for them to communicate with their audience and promote Year 7 intake to the school in 2021".

"The interactive properties of the virtual tour engage the user far more in that they have more control in what they see and where, so we felt that this method was more likely to encourage and promote repeat visits to the website where it will reside. The tour can also be viewed away from the website platform and promoted independently via social media."



Pete added: "It was an absolute pleasure working with the client on this project. Mrs Luisa May, our direct contact organised everything to make our job as seamless as possible. The school itself is lovely - it oozes warmth and friendliness from both staff and pupils made the project an absolute pleasure to work on."

Our Head Teacher, David Thomas said: "Like everybody else working through this pandemic we have been thinking about how we can do what we normally do under the current restrictions and conditions."

He added: "Open Evenings and Parents Evenings are a particular challenge at the moment and the opportunity to create a virtual tour to allow people to "visit" the school and have a look at our facilities is a real asset. It also allows visitors to meet some of our staff and get a flavour of the school. We are delighted with the results from Pete and the team."

Blended Learning

ince March 2020, we have made great strides with our online learning, moving the school online during lockdown, and since September we have adapted our model following feedback from pupils, parents and staff. We now have a Blended Learning model which brings together face-to-face classroom teaching and online learning. This has to be adaptable to suit learners who are unable to attend school due to self-isolating while the rest of their class are in school, and also for periods of time such as the 'fire-break lockdown' when whole year groups were forced to work from home.

Our online learning uses a blend of Google Classroom online work and Microsoft Teams live learning. Online work within Google classroom now includes a mixture of online quizzes, professional and teacher made videos to support learning alongside online tasks. Many pupils have had the opportunity to participate in online lessons from core subjects and we are now moving towards the model of face-to-face tutorial video sessions for pupils to get individual help whilst unable to attend school.

Altro Evolve Radio Platfform career sessions

areers Wales have been working in partnership with the Radio Platfform team at Wales Millennium Centre (WMC) to deliver careerbased sessions to a group of ten Year 10 Altro-Evolve pupils from St Illtyd's Catholic High School. During the sessions pupils will interview employers, create their own radio show, record and edit it. The show will then be played in their school over the speaker system during lunch times.


Radio Platfform is a youth-led radio station supporting young people to produce and present their own live radio shows which are also available as podcasts.

A four-session programme was developed by Ed; who works at Radio Platfform, the schools Careers Adviser and Business Engagement Adviser. All sessions lasted two hours and were to take place fortnightly.

Session one involved an introduction to the radio station and WMC, a talk about different careers available in the creative sector, WMC and radio. The pupils engaged really well, they were taught how to start creating a radio show and had a go at using the equipment. The pupils also started to think about the music they would like used in the radio programme.

In Session two the pupils worked on planning the content of their show and learnt how to interview each other using the radio equipment. Ed and his colleague delivered workshops on how to structure a show and interview people. The pupils also worked together to choose the types of employers they would like to interview. It was agreed that someone from the sports sector; preferably football would be interviewed, along with a make-up artist and carpenter. A trainer from Cardiff City Training Academy was





sourced and a make-up artist and carpenter from the production showing at the theatre at the time.

Unfortunately, due to Lockdown and the school closing we were unable to deliver sessions three and four so they have been postponed. When we continue with the sessions, they will either be delivered at the WMC or if required; at the school as Radio Platfform have portable equipment.



During session three the pupils will interview the employers; having spent time previously with their Careers Adviser deciding what questions they will ask and who will take on each role. Session four will involve the pupils being shown how to edit the show and add music and jingles.

We are sure the pupils will be keen to progress with their planned show and interview employers when we can continue.



This term, we have appointed a specialist literacy teacher, Mrs Tracey Davies, to run a full timetable of interventions covering guided reading, comprehension and spelling. This initiative ensures that pupils who are identified as requiring extra support receive quality time to improve their literacy levels in our dedicated literacy classroom.

A second initiative introduced this term is the purchase of classroom readers for every form class in Years 7, 8 and 9. This has been made possible due to kind donations from Cardiff Community Housing

Association who donated £1,000 and Cansford Laboratories who donated £600. We are extremely grateful to both of our funders for their generous donations and would like to thank them both. We would also like to thank Rob Petersen from Petersen's PR, for his support in making the links with Cansford Laboratories.

CCFC Foundation inspires pupils

his term at St Illtyd's, groups of pupils have been taking part in the Transition and Premier Leagues Inspires Projects, delivered by Cardiff City Football Club Foundation.

Targeted Year 7 pupils have been taking part in the Transition Project. The programme aims to reduce anxiety about change associated with the transition into secondary school. After Christmas, the project will begin in our four feeder Catholic primary schools and will continue when they start at St Illtyd's. The project looks to develop or maintain pupil's motivation and positive attitudes during a significant period in the lives of young people, equip them with the necessary skills and knowledge to be confident and competent to fully access post-transition opportunities, develop the tools and skills to deal with the emotional challenges of transition and increase the amount of physical activity

undertaken each week.

Alongside the Transition
Project, targeted pupils
in all year groups have
embarked on the Premier
League Inspires Project. This
is an initiative that supports
children in secondary
education who are at risk
of not achieving their full
potential. The programme
sets out to inspire children

and young people to develop personal skills and positive attitudes to succeed in life. "Inspires" supports participants' engagement using the theme of football and supports secondary schools to keep pupils present and committed whilst encouraging others to re-engage with school life. In the sessions, pupils learn about healthier lifestyles, resilience and well-being.



Pupils are challenged to take part in a community-based project to create a social action idea that will significantly benefit and make a positive difference to Cardiff City Football Club and the surrounding community. Year groups will compete against each other, and the winning team will go on to compete against other Cardiff schools. We will update you on the progress of this project throughout the year.

Nearpod – a new initiative within Digital Skills & Business

OVID-19 has presented several teaching and learning obstacles in relation to government guidelines. For me, as an NQT, developing some of the pedagogy practised last year was going to be a challenge with regard to pupil motivation, lesson pace and work assessments.

Researching the myriad of learning and teaching platforms available, I came across a platform that can facilitate and enhance motivation, pace and assessment in my lessons which can be assessed remotely at a time when teachers are forced to be distanced from learners.

The platform is called Nearpod and it is gathering popularity, especially because of COVID-19 and remote learning across the education spectrum.

The learning platform includes two basic

components: content and activities.

The content consists of slides, access to web content, VR field trip, educational videos, slideshows, a pdf viewer and a facility to add videos with embedded questions.

The activities include open-ended questions, matching pairs, quizzes, whiteboards, polls, memory tests, and gamified plenaries.

Another function the software provides is Microsoft's Immersive reader- a facility to support reading and comprehension aiding pupils with dyslexia, and a translation tool which is of considerable help to our EAL learners.

We, in Digital Skills and Business Studies, have found during our first term in school that the learners are positively engaged with the activities.

Through the use of the variety of learning

tasks, learners are motivated and keen to improve and develop their knowledge.


The pace of the activities is managed, so each pupil has the opportunity to complete each learning objective within a flexible time window and they can then carry on with the rest of the class, leaving no pupil behind.

Assessment of every activity takes place in real-time, therefore interventions can be focussed on the specific learners, as required.

Each learner has the opportunity at the end of the lesson to self-evaluate their success and critique their performance.

Nearpod has changed the way we teach within our department. It has provided remote assessments, engagement, fun and the progressive attainment of all our learners' abilities.
