HEAD'S MESSAGE | NEGES Y PENNAETH

2023 marks the centenary year of St Illtyd's Catholic High School. There is a lot to celebrate. The current school was created with the merger of St Illtyd's college for boys and Heathfield House grammar school for girls.

St Illtyd's College was founded in 1923, when the De La Salle Brothers came to Cardiff to open a Roman Catholic school for boys. The school was opened as a grammar school on a site in Courtenay Road in the Splott area of the city.

In 1941, during the Second World War, the main school building was badly damaged by a bomb. Severe overcrowding due to the damage sustained and growing pupil numbers led to the school moving to its current location on Newport Road in Rumney.

Heathfield House was a Roman Catholic grammar school for girls, founded by the Sisters of Providence of the Institute of Charity in 1867. It was initially called St Joseph's Grammar School, though it moved to Heathfield House on Richmond Road in 1877 which led to the school changing its name. In the 1970s the school moved again to a site on Ty Gwyn Road in Penylan.

In 1987, the two schools were merged as part of the reorganisation of Catholic education. The school was renamed St Illtyd's Catholic High School and was now a co-educational school for pupils aged 11-16. Sixth form provision was transferred to the new St David's Catholic College situated in the vacated Heathfield campus on Ty Gwyn Road.

Our current pupils have a lot to live up to but, also a lot to be inspired by, from those who have gone before. Old Illtydians can be found all over Wales and the world. What unites the past and present is a shared set of values and an emphasis on the highest of standards in all that we do.

It has been a privilege to receive correspondence from, "Old Illts" and to meet many with their recollections of their time at the school. With such a rich history there is much to celebrate this year and we are planning events which will provide opportunities for people to meet once again. Our website will be updated, and publicity will follow once activities, dates and venues are confirmed.

The school continues to grow in numbers and the work on enhancing its facilities is ongoing. St Illtyd's is constantly evolving - nothing stands still, and nothing stays the same. This is due to the pupils who come through the gates. All are different but together they are the school.

In that respect, nothing has changed over the last 100 years. It has always been, and will always be, about the pupils.

Future Minds

Helping school children in Wales experience a future career in healthcare through virtual reality

G Goggleminds









uture Minds is an initiative run by Cardiff-based company, Goggleminds, with the aim of inspiring the future generation of healthcare professionals. Working closely with Careers Wales and Welsh schools, Goggleminds delivers sessions to students aged 11-16, talking to them about the job opportunities in healthcare and giving them experiences of working as a medic in virtual reality.

A group of students attended the session which ran from 11am – 1pm. The session began with a discussion about careers in the NHS and students' experience of healthcare. After the discussion, students were given the

opportunity to pick and try a medical simulation in virtual reality from one of the Goggleminds library. Students were initially guided on how to navigate the simulations and then given the freedom to explore. After the VR element of the session, there was a debrief, exploring how the students felt about the virtual experience and





addressing previously held perceptions of careers in healthcare. 90% of the students stated that the session inspired them to think about a career in healthcare. Pupil comments included:

"So fun, I learnt a lot. I would have liked more time, next time." "My favourite part was learning the foundations of what the NHS community does on a daily basis."

> The session was a huge success with all the students in attendance getting the opportunity to experience what it could be like to be a healthcare professional in the NHS. The feedback was very positive for all the students that participated. The session

Spreading joy at Advent



The second project was creating gift bags for the residents in Quarry Hall Care Home with pupils from St John Lloyd RC Primary School. St John Lloyd collected a fantastic selection of gifts that had been kindly donated by their pupils and families. Our Year 10 Youth Action Group was invited to Holy Family church by the SVP Centre to help pack over 100 Christmas Food Hampers for vulnerable families.
