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1. <u>Introduction</u>

5. <u>Physical Education Provision</u>

At **Key Stage 3** each class has 3 lessons of PE a fortnight.

Pupils develop skills in the following sports and skills under the national curriculum: competitive, creative, adventurous and health, fitness and wellbeing areas: football, rugby, outdoor adventurous activities, gym, dance (boys and girls), health and well-being, dodgeball, netball, athletics, Welsh baseball and basketball.

At **Key Stage 4** pupils have 2 hours per fortnight. The department offers football, rugby, health and well-being, dodgeball, Welsh baseball, badminton, and aerobics.

PE at GCSE level is 40% practical and covers football, rugby, badminton, basketball, circuit training, hill walking (Storey Arms), netball, Welsh baseball and athletics. Pupils then receive 2 lessons a fortnight of theory in preparation for a 2-hour exam paper. Pupils also have the option to study towards a Level 1/2 Vocational Award in Sport and Coaching Principles.

Extra-curricular activities included are football, girls and boys (Yrs 8-11), rugby (Y's 7-10), netball (Yrs 7-10), hockey (Yrs 7-9 girls only), baseball (girls and boys Yrs 7-10) and athletics (all year groups)

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8. Links with the Community

St Illtyd's continues to develop substantial links with the community both locally and more widely in Cardiff. The following steps were taken during the year to develop and strengthen the links with the community (including links with the police):

The school is engaged with a wide range of outside agencies and regularly works with the South Wales Police, Cardiff Against Bullying and Team Around The Child to provide multi-faceted support for pupils within the school.

The school's Facebook page and Twitter feed are used regularly to promote school events and to allow families the opportunity to communicate with the school too.

Our termly newsletter 'The New Illtydian' is sent home to all parents and distributed widely within the community and parishes to highlight the great things that happen in the school.

As a result of Covid and subsequent lockdowns, our extra curriculum activities and community work have been affected. We restarted them in 2021/2022 and they continue to flourish this academic year, 2022/2023.

The school attendance target for 2023 – 2024 is 89%. Prior to Covid the school achieved 93.3% attendance with 2022/2023 reaching 87.5%.

COVID has impacted on the whole school attendance and the school has taken numerous measures to overcome the obstacles and barriers caused by the pandemic.

The School has adopted robust systems of monitoring attendance to ensure pupils and families are supported where there are attendance issues. The School has recently appointed a Family

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Engagement Officer and an Attendance Officer who also work with our feeder primary schools. Their role is to support the Assistant Heads of Year by engaging with families to offer support and guidance.

Pupils with excellent attendance are rewarded via Class Charts and end of term awards.

10. Review of Strategies

Curriculum Developments

This year we continued to collect a "triangle" of evidence for standards in teaching and learning, pupil observations, work scrutiny and teacher observations. We also developed pupil voice as a further source of feedback and judgement on standards.

A new feedback policy has been introduced and the impact of this is going to be a major feature of our work/book scrutiny's next year. Classroom teachers will assess their marking. This will then be checked by Heads of department and Heads of faculty. SLT and representatives from the central south consortium are then to carry out a random book sample.

This is to check for consistency and that the standards of marking are accurate and good enough to enable pupils to make progress.

Curriculum for Wales

We have completed the first year of its introduction and have reported on pupil progress three times in accordance with our statutory requirements. Assessing progress has been a constant work in progress as we test for knowledge and skills. The change in our feedback policy not only reflects this but is also designed to have an impact on the quality of pupil feedback. Reporting has started in Year 7 and will carried on into year 8 in 2023/2024.

12. Changes to the School Prospectus

The School Prospectus was revised in 2021/2022 and continues to meet and exceed statutory guidelines. The updated sections include a list of governors and members of the leadership team; term dates; a pastoral breakdown of the school; admissions policy and right of appeal; curriculum organisation (including the status of Religious Education as a core subject) and school expectations including the guidelines for uniform. The school has invested in a Virtual Tour that is

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hosted on the school website. It provides a flavor of the school by including a welcome message from the Headteacher and short videos from some lessons. This will be used for prospective parents, pupils and members of staff.

13. Curriculum and Organisation of Education and Teaching Methods

At **Key Stage 3** all pupils are taught in ability groupings for the core subject areas of English, Maths and Science. In all foundation subject areas, pupils are taught in mixed ability groupings as a form group.

At **Key Stage 4**, in addition to the core subject areas of English, Maths, Science, RE, Welsh and Welsh Baccalaureate, pupils follow various options as laid out in the options process during the Spring term of Year 9. These are updated annually and reflect changes to curriculum reform and key school performance measures.

All departments at the school are subject to annual departmental review and members of teaching staff are able to access support from a Learning & Teaching Coach to support, guide and develop the various teaching methods employed across the school.

A team of Teaching Assistants are employed to support learners who have a statement of special educational needs or an IDP. A number of intervention strategies are utilised to ensure pupils are able to accelerate their learning and catch up. In addition to this, we provide further support in our learning to learn group. There are two classes in Key Stage 3, and pupils have been placed in there according to their need. It is a "revolving door" provision and pupils can move out of it when they have made sufficient progress. The majority of lessons taught are a skills based curriculum by the same specialist teacher to ensure a smooth transition from primary into their secondary education. Pupils are only in this class for a some of their timetable. They spend the majority of their curriculum time in their registration group or set class.

More able and talented pupils are identified in each key stage. These are **pupils who are working above expectation** when referencing prior attainment. The attainment and engagement of pupils who fit into this category is closely monitored in order to secure continued academic progress in all subject areas. A suite of 'enrichment opportunities' is also planned throughout the year, with the aim of providing a range of experiences beyond the school. Visits such as university taster days to Oxford and Cambridge, attendance at educational conferences and discussion groups are examples. Pupils are also encouraged and supported to work independently outside the classroom in order to broaden their aspirations and work towards securing the very best grades. In addition, the school has a More Able and Talented (MAT) Coordinator who assesses abilities and talents in all subject areas using baseline and current data. Subject leaders are then supported in developing extended provision for these pupils.

14. Welsh Language

The language status of the school is English Medium.

At key stage 3, pupils have 3 lessons of Welsh per fortnight in mixed ability groups. Teaching staff use seating plans to ensure pupils mix well and support each other in their learning. In Key Stage

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4 pupils have 4 lessons per fortnight, are set in line with their ability and follow the WJEC GCSE course in Welsh Second Language.

In addition to sessions where we teach Welsh as a second language, the school promotes the use of incidental Welsh throughout the school.

15. Toilets

The school provides toilet facilities to cater for all pupils. We have two main sets of pupil toilets, one is designated for use by Key Stage 3 pupils and one for Key Stage 4 during set break times. One set of toilets is available and open all day for all pupils to use. In addition, toilet facilities are provided in the changing rooms located within both the Gymnasium and Sports Hall. We also have a number of disabled toilets that are especially adapted and equipped for the students that require their use.

Toilets are fitted with toilet roll dispensers, washbasins, liquid hand soap, hand dryers, air fresheners and air cleaning units. Hand sanitiser stations have been installed outside each toilet block. The toilets are monitored and maintained by our Estates & cleaning staff on a regular basis to ensure ongoing cleanliness and that supplies are available for pupils. Each toilet block is regularly cleaned during the school day, and are thoroughly cleaned every evening by our cleaning team.

16. Healthy Eating

The school complies with the requirements of the Welsh Government's Appetite for Life program. The school's menu includes healthy drinks and healthy meals. Chips are offered twice a week and no confectionery or sugary fizzy drinks are available. Monitoring and feedback on the choices available are listened to through pupil voice, and fed back to the school's catering contractor (Cardiff Council) on a regular basis.

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
