Thanks to Matt Tomlinson from Cardiff Metropolitan University, these pupils engaged in a Cyber Security STEAM afterschool club, spanning five weeks of enriching activities. The club covered a diverse range of topics, including cryptography, encoding and decoding ciphers, interactive security systems, and more. This unique opportunity facilitated the growth of critical thinking and problem-solving skills among the students.

Working collaboratively, the pupils operated a robot through a track and honed their programming skills using Tinkercad, creating 3D digital designs with online CAD using Arduino. The students actively participated by interacting with the tutor, posing insightful questions to deepen their understanding of the complex topics they encountered. This experience has been instrumental in fostering a culture of curiosity and continuous learning.

GCSE Food practical exams

his term Year 11 Food and Nutrition pupils have taken part in their Food Preparation exam. Pupils were asked to select a topic between 'the many uses of eggs' or 'popular multicultural foods in Wales.' The pupils were expected to plan and prepare three courses based around the topic they chose. A variety of medium and high-level skills were developed and used in the practical exams including; sauce making, bread and pasta dough making and using setting agents. All pupils did exceptionally well and excelled in the task.

Visit to Aston Martin

n Wednesday 10th and Thursday 11th January 2024, all Year 10s studying Product Design had the opportunity to visit Aston Martin in St. Athans. During this visit we were able to see how they manufactured the vehicles by hand using AGVs (automated guided vehicles) and seeing models yet to be released. During this visit, we also got to view the colours that Aston Martin uses for their car production and what the issues of applying the paint were. For instance, their main dilemma was the dirt when applying the coating. Colours such as 'Aston Martin Jet Ski Green' and 'Satin Xenon Grey' have been thoroughly researched by experts because they have a unique base layer and finish layer which enhances the appearance in different lighting.

Furthermore, we witnessed car parts being applied with glue by a machine which takes 72 hours to fully dry. The crucial part to make the vehicle operate is connecting the engine to the main body. This process is carried out by highly trained workers who cannot make a mistake. Next the four cables are connected to the undercarriage of the vehicle. After that stage, the workers use management control to check for risk assessments which starts with the pressurized test. If the vehicle leaks, it is then taken to a special place so the fuel can leak out safely. The furniture is then applied inside the vehicle. The windows are lifted with a mechanical arm to aid them. Lastly, the vehicle undergoes two more tests, the first is pressurized air to see if it can be felt inside and secondly, they are put through an area to see if any water leaks inside. The vehicles are then driven and cleaned to be shipped to dealerships. This was a truly amazing experience to watch first-hand and was informative of the process of making a vehicle. Year 9 Seren STEM day

t the end of February, a small group of Year 9 pupils attended a STEM event at Cardiff University organised by the Seren Academy. The Seren Academy is a fully funded Welsh Government initiative dedicated to supporting Wales' most able state educated learners achieve their full academic potential into leading universities and succeed on highly selective degree programmes.

Pupils took part in four workshops on the day. The first was with Balfour Beatty, an international infrastructure group that finance, develop, build and maintain the vital infrastructure we all depend on. The team from Balfour Beatty informed our pupils that engineering is in everything around us and that there is currently a huge demand for engineers. We met "Spot the Dog" – an ingenious piece of machinery that can take measurements at the different projects that Balfour Beatty work on. Pupils were then challenged to build a bridge that would support a drinks bottle using only drinking straws, wooden knives, and tape.

In the second workshop with Airbus, pupils



learnt that an engineer is:

"A person who designs, builds or maintains engines, machines or structures."

They learnt that an engineer is someone who can apply maths and science to real life problems.

In the third workshop with Network Rail, pupils had fun testing chocolate bars to see which bar took the most weight when used as a bridge. And in the final workshop, pupils met Ffion Humphreys, a Civil Engineering Masters student who challenged them to build the tallest free-standing tower using only paper and tape.

Our pupils had a great time at the event whilst gaining a better understanding of engineering. We would like to thank all of the organisations for their time and the Seren Academy team for organising the event.








Get ready to Rock!
