
St Illtyd's Christmas Market 2024



A s the colder months drew in last term, pupils from St Illtyd's and St Peter's Catholic Primary School met together to assess how they could help the vulnerable within our communities. After some wonderful ideas, pupils decided to repeat a previous successful collaboration, where each school would fundraise to buy supplies to fill bags with winter essentials for those who are street homeless. St Peter's kindly hosted the homeless bag workshop, providing some lovely refreshments for our hard-working pupils. We were blessed to be visited by Naomi from the SVP Centre, who took the time to speak to the pupils about homelessness in Cardiff and all the work that they have been doing to help those in need. The giftbags were filled with winter essentials, a festive treat and a handwritten Christmas card to spread joy and hope through the Christmas season. Once completed, Naomi took the giftbags back to the SVP Centre ready to deliver to the street homeless within the city centre. During Advent, we invited pupils from both St John Lloyd and St Albans RC Primary Schools up to take part in some crafting activities. Members of the Year 9 Chaplaincy team helped St Albans pupils craft advent wreaths out of card while chatting about their day and Christmas plans. Fr Alexander joined us and led us in a final prayer in the Chapel. The festive events continued with our very own Christingle workshop with children from St John Lloyd RC Primary School. The Head Girl, Isabelle Haines, helped lead the workshop and assist the younger pupils with the more challenging parts. It was a lovely opportunity for some of our Year 7 pupils, who were past pupils of St John Lloyd, to join the workshop and catch up with old friends and teachers.

As well as working with our primary school community, pupils have been working with members of our local community. St Cadoc's Church Care Group very kindly donated food to St Illtyd's foodbank to help fill hampers for struggling families over Christmas. Members of the Year 8 Chaplaincy team worked hard to wrap and fill hamper boxes with food donated by the care group as well as our own pupils. They managed to fill 20 large hampers with food, small gifts and toiletries. Hampers went out to families in our local community as well as to Rumney Forum and St Vincent de Paul Centre.

Raising awareness about childhood obesity in schools and what St Illtyd's could do

hildhood obesity within Wales has seen a rise these past years, where children living in a sedentary lifestyle is increasingly becoming more common. According to official percentages, 26% of adults in Wales are classed as obese, but the innovation charity Nesta says the true figure is 34%, equivalent to an extra 200,000 people. In Wales, the percentage of childhood obesity is 'over one quarter of children in Wales aged four to five are overweight or obese.'

St Illtyd's achieves in preventing childhood obesity in certain aspects; there are plenty of sports, after school clubs, PE, educating pupils of healthy eating in PSE and Food Technology. However, my research has shown that some of the food and drink available in the canteen can be classed as unhealthy. Some options that are considered unhealthy, being high in sugar and fat content, for example are Radnor Fizz drinks and sugary snacks. Research says that unhealthy meals contribute to causes of obesity, Children are failing to meet the nutritional standards by eating foods that are high in calories, fat and sugar. Cardiff Council uses the secondary high school FFRES menu, many agree that the meals present themselves as appetising however, one person commented that the chicken salad had cheese, coleslaw and mayonnaise, which are products high in fat.



In contrast, the average primary school meal consists of choosing a main meal, a carbohydrate and a vegetable of the day; for example, a pupil can choose pizza, sweetcorn and potato for their dinner which contains a varied and balanced set of nutrients. There is also a distinct lack of sugary drinks. All pupils in primary school are now entitled to free school meals. Secondary school pupils are at a disadvantage, as they are not served meals, instead they are served snacks that do not cover a wide range of nutritional bases. For example, pupils in schools often buy a calzone, cookie and a fizzy drink. This is not an ideal meal and does not meet the standards of nutrition for a growing teenager.

Preventing childhood obesity in school is a key principle as schools are responsible for taking care of children's wellbeing. By cutting down unhealthy food and maintaining daily exercise, childhood obesity can be easily prevented.

As a school, we acknowledge the prevalent issue that food can impact on students. The Eco Club completed an Eco Schools Environmental Review 2024-2025 and found that there were both positives and negatives to the food served, such as not having enough healthy options, for example there are few options for vegans or vegetarians.

The Eco Club also mentioned in their findings that they do not have any opportunity to make suggestions due to not having a school nutrition group. This has been addressed recently as members of the Eco Club along with other pupils have been involved in the tender process for a new catering contract in the canteen. Pupils were able to sample food and provide feedback on what they wanted to see in the canteen in the future. Our pupils are looking to the future and are excited about our new catering contract and the new food options that will bring.

RYA Keelboat Level 1 – Start Sailing course with Cardiff Sailing Centre

he sailing trip was a lovely experience to learn how to sail and socialize with your friends, but mostly it was really educational, we learnt the basics of sailing and had a great understanding on how to sail First, we got to the Cardiff Sailing Centre with the school minibus, then when we got there, we sat down and the two teachers, Tom and Anthony, talked through what we would be doing during these two days of learning. Then we put on our kit- a life jacket and water-resistant trousers. Then we started the practical part. We went outside and saw the keelboat in the waters. We started by uncovering the main sail, it was covered with a black thick leather, then we raised it up by dragging a thick rope which was really hard and required loads of strength to complete, then the teacher untied the fender away from the side of the boat. There were four fenders and these fenders protects the boat from the pontoon. In my own definition, the pontoon is like a wooden flat-bottomed structure or float typically used to hold the boat in place in order for the boat not to float away due to how strong the wind can be. The boat is held to the pontoon with a very thick rope and is knotted in a specific way, with an "OXO" knot so it won't become loose easily. Then we began sailing, we moved quite slowly as we prepped the boat. We achieved this by putting the Jib up, which is the smaller sail. We learnt a lot about sailing, the wind directions and how to know the wind directions. All crew members had a job to do, one had to control the mainsail with a rope, the other two had to control the Jib, the smaller sail, then the last person (captain) had to control the tiller. The tiller is considered as the boats steering wheel, it controls the movement of the boat. So we were not idle and bored while sailing, we all swapped and had a turn at all jobs.

We sailed across the wind, called the "Beam Reach", then we learnt how to sail towards the wind called the "Broad Reach". To turn, the captain in control of the tiller shouts "ready about" to his or her crew members, this is to ask them to check for any obstacle closeby that could cause wreckage while turning, if there isn't any obstacle they say "yes" and the captain shouts "lee hoo" to inform them that he or she is about to turn the boat and make them prepared to drag or release the ropes controlling the main sails and Jib. To turn, you need to push the tiller away from you and towards the mainsail, then when the mainsail comes to the middle of the boat you swap sides to control the tiller better and also watch your head because the main sail comes quickly. This turning is called tacking because when you turn, pushing the tiller away from you, it pushes the boat to the wind.

We learnt how to gybe as well. To gybe, the sailor says "stand by to gybe" then the crew members check for any obstacle and if there is none, they say "yes" then he or she says "gybe hoo" and pulls the tiller towards them and switches sides when the mainsail is in the middle. Gybing pushes the boat away from the wind while tacking pushes the boat to the wind.

Theoretically, we learnt some basic things to know in sailing, like Onshore and Offshore wind. Onshore wind is when the boat is harder to leave the pontoon to sail and easier to come back to the pontoon, this is known by the direction of the wind. While Offshore is opposite, meaning it is easier for the boat to leave the pontoon to sail and harder to come back on the pontoon, this still depends on the direction of the wind. To know the direction of the wind you can feel it on your face. You can know by the direction of the waves in the water, you can also tell by the wind vane at the top of the Keelboat or by looking at a flag. In the classrooms we learnt about the rules of sailing, they are;

- If two boats are almost in collision, and one of the boats is a starboard and the other a port, the port should move away. This is because the port has a better chance of moving quicker because of the wind direction.
 - To know which is the starboard or the port, if the wind direction is hitting the right side of the boat, it is a starboard.
 - While a port is identified if the wind direction is hitting the left side of the boat
- 2. If it is a starboard and another starboard about to crash or a port and another port, the boat closer to the wind is the one responsible to move.
- 3. If a boat is speeding, it is obliged to avoid other boats.
- 4. Avoid collisions in total.
- 5. Always check the forecast and check the chart to know if the weather is safe for sailing.

We were later taught how to tie different ropes in the boats which was really easy and engaging. Overall this trip was a great experience and an unforgettable experience.
